## THE FIRST 100 DAYS: PRESIDENT TRUMP'S CHINA POLICY

*CHINA Town Hall 2025*

Since 2007, the National Committee of U.S.-China Relations has convened its annual CHINA Town Hall (CTH), a national conversation that brings the voices of communities from across the United States into the discussion of U.S.-China relations and its impact on our lives. This year's program will feature leading experts Ryan Hass, director of the John L. Thornton China Center at the Brookings Institution, Matthew Turpin, visiting fellow at the Hoover Institution, and Lingling Wei, chief China correspondent at *The Wall Street Journal*. The national livestream will be followed by a local discussion hosted by Professor Andrés Oñate. The national topic is as follows:

Since beginning his second term, President Trump has changed the dynamic of the bilateral relationship by imposing additional tariffs, further restricting semiconductor exports, and increasing scrutiny on inbound and outbound investment between the United States and China. With economic and technological competition taking center stage, the need for informed dialogue through CTH is more critical than ever. The national, livestreamed town hall, in conjunction with local town halls, provides a unique opportunity to engage with communities across the United States to discuss the leading issues in the U.S.-China relationship.
